RESOLVED, That the Maryland Environmental Service report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly by January 1, 1986; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of Legislative Reference to the Honorable Harry Hughes, Governor of Maryland, the Honorable Benjamin L. Cardin, Speaker of the House of Delegates, the Honorable Melvin A. Steinberg, President of the Senate of Maryland, the Honorable Torrey Brown, Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources, and the Honorable Adele Wilzack, Secretary of the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.

A House Joint Resolution concerning
