

This bill modifies the State aid for police protection formula and requires the Superintendent of the Maryland State Police to monitor and enforce the local maintenance of effort requirements contained in the formula.

House Bill 460, which was passed by the General Assembly and signed by me on May 21, 1985, accomplishes the same purpose. Therefore, it is not necessary for me to sign Senate Bill 265.

Police Protection Aid --Minimum-Grant

FOR the purpose of establishing a minimum payment of State aid for police protection to certain subdivisions based on a certain grant year; requiring subdivisions and qualifying municipalities to maintain a certain level of funding support for police protection; and generally relating to State aid for police protection.
