I have sent the original manumission paper, in which you will find his name, which Miss Waring sent to me last summer. I saw Miss Ann Waring last Saturday, and she told me she ~~was going~~ would send him down to Malbro for his papers, be pleased to return by John the manumission deed I send by him.
