(House Bill 695)

FOR the purpose of expanding the mandate of the Commission Disorders to include congenital disorders; Hereditary defining congenital disorders; altering the definition altering---the--membership--of--the hereditary disorder: Commission; permitting the Governor to appoint certain persons to the Commission under specified circumstances; modifying the powers and duties of the Commission; expanding the authority of the Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene adopt regulations for hereditary and congenital disorders; repealing the authority of the Commission to promulgate regulations for hereditary and congenital disorders; altering the disclosure of information criteria for individuals with hereditary or congenital disorders; expanding the duties of the Secretary to include enforcement of the rules, regulations, and standards that the Department concerning hereditary and congenital disorders adopts
