- Is a full-time student; (1)
- (2) Continues to be a resident of this State; and
- (3) Continues to be a student at the institution and least 12 semester hours of courses as an undergraduate takes at or 9 semester hours of courses as a graduate student each semester leading to a degree.
- (b) A recipient of an undergraduate OR GRADUATE senatorial scholarship may hold the scholarship, appropriately prorated, for 8 academic years if he:
  - (1) Is a part-time student;
  - (2) Continues to be a resident of this State; and
- (3) Continues to be a student at the institution and takes at least 6 semester hours of courses each semester leading to a degree.
- Any recipient of a senatorial scholarship may use up to one-half of the yearly award for summer school if the recipient is scheduled to graduate immediately after the fall academic semester following summer school.
- (d) A recipient of a senatorial scholarship who is enrolled in a terminal certificate program as provided in Section 18-402(a) may hold the scholarship for 2 years if he is a full-time student and otherwise meets the conditions subsection (a) of this section, or may hold the scholarship for 4 years if he is a part-time student and otherwise meets the conditions of subsection (b) of this section.
- (e) Each recipient of a senatorial scholarship who enrolled in a private postsecondary proprietary institution that is accredited by a national accrediting association approved by the United States Department of Education:
- (1) May hold the scholarship for the completion of 1 if the student otherwise meets the conditions paragraphs (1) and (2) of subsection (a) of this section; and
- Shall complete the program within the length of time prescribed by the institution for the completion of the program.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 1987.
