January 1, 1988. A certificate of temporary certification issued in accordance with the provisions of this Act shall be valid until July 1, 1991.

SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Board of Medical Examiners shall adopt standards specifying radiological procedures that may be performed by individuals who are issued a certificate of temporary certification under Section 2 of this Act.

SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Board of Medical Examiners shall develop, by July 1, 1989, a permanent certification examination that is designed to evaluate minimum cognitive skills and technical proficiency for uncertified individuals employed, as of January 1, 1988, as medical radiation technologists or nuclear medical technologists. The test developed under this section shall be utilized by the Board until July 1, 1991.

SECTION 3 2 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 1988.
