8-505. PURCHASE OF LICENSE.

A PERSON MAY NOT BUY OR OTHERWISE OBTAIN BY GIVING CONSIDERATION A LICENSE CERTIFICATE WITH THE INTENTION OF USING IT TO INDICATE THAT THE PERSON IS AUTHORIZED TO PROVIDE HEARING AID SERVICES.
