Be it remembered that the following deed of Manumission was recorded on the 20th day of September A. D. 1851, to wit:

To all whom it may concern, be it known that I, John Kune, of Dorchester County in the State of Maryland, for diverse good causes & considerations me therunto moving, have taken from slavery, ^{liberated} manumitted & set free, and by these presents do hereby release from slavery, liberate, manumit & set free, my negro woman Ritty Kuneard ^{the} ~~my~~ ^{young} of the age of forty three years, and able to work & gain a sufficient livelihood and maintenance, and in the said negro woman named Ritty Kuneard I do hereby declare to be henceforth free, manumitted & discharged from all manner of service or servitude to me, my Executors or administrators forever. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal affixed this 20th day of September 1851.

Be it remembered that the following Bill of Sale was recorded on the 6th day of October 1851 -

Know all men by these presents that I, Benton St. Crockett, of Dorchester County State of Maryland, for and in consideration of the sum of One dollar, current money of Maryland, in hand paid by Ann Jane Barrow, of Baltimore City in the State aforesaid, at or before the sealing of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained & sold, and by these presents do grant, bargain & sell, unto the said Ann Jane Barrow, her Executors, Administrators & Assigns, one Negro Woman Caroline, aged twenty one years, a slave for life: To have and to hold - the said Negro Woman Caroline, as above bargained & sold, to the said Ann Jane Barrow, her Executors, Administrators & Assigns forever. And I, the said Benton St. Crockett, for myself, my heirs, Executors and Administrators, the said Negro Woman Caroline unto Ann Jane Barrow, her Executors, Administrators & Assigns and against him the said Benton St. Crockett, his heirs, Executors, Administrators and Assigns, against him the said Benton St. Crockett, his heirs, Executors and Administrators, and against all
