Be it remembered that the following Indenture was recorded on the 20th day of October 1851, to wit: This Indenture do witness that in virtue of an Act of the General Assembly of Maryland passed December Session Eighteen hundred & thirty nine Chapter 35 entitled an act to provide for the better regulation of the free Negroes & Mulattos Children within this State, the Justices of the Orphans Court of Dorchester County have summoned before them a free colored Girl by the name of Elizabeth Harrow who is without Father & Mother and in the opinion of this Court not competent to make choice of her own home and without any visible means of support have bound her the said Girl out. Therefore witnesseth that I, John Willis (Draw Bridge) agree with the Justices of the Orphans Court to take Negro Girl Elizabeth Harrow who has been before the said Justices the said Elizabeth being of the age of ten years on the first day of September of this present year as an apprentice untill she attains the age of sixteen years and agree to furnish & provide for her good & sufficient Meat, drink washing and lodging and other things which may be necessary & requisite and customary to be furnished apprentices and when she attains
