 - (b) [(1)] The Fund is limited to a maximum of \$10,000,000 \$15,000,000.
- [(2) If the sum of unallocated funds in the Fund and the projected fees for the next fiscal year exceeds \$10,000,000 \$15,000,000, the Board of Public Works shall adjust the fees for the next fiscal year on a pro rata basis so that the sum of unallocated and actual fees does not exceed \$10,000,000 \$15,000,000.]

SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Board of Public Works is requested to decrease the tire recycling fee imposed under \$ 9-228(g) of the Environment-Article to a reasonable level below the current ceiling of \$1.00 per tire during fiscal years 1999 and 2000, prior to the elimination of the fee under this Act.

SECTION 4. 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Sections 1 and 3 Section 1 of this Act shall take effect October 1, 1997, and Section 2 of this Act shall take effect July 1, 2000.

(Senate Bill 738)

AN ACT concerning
