(g) "Humane method" means either: (1) A method whereby the animal is rendered insensible to pain by mechanical, electrical, chemical or other means that is rapid and effective, before being shackled, hoisted, thrown, [case] CAST, or cut; or (2) a method in accordance with ritual requirements of the Jewish faith or any other religious faith, whereby the animal suffers loss of consciousness by anemia of the brain caused by simultaneous and instantaneous severance of the carotid arteries with a sharp instrument. The use of a manually operated hammer, sledge or poleax during slaughtering operations is specifically declared to be an inhumane method of slaughter within the meaning of this subtitle.
