AN ACT concerning

Crimes - Use of Cameras and Visual Surveillance

FOR the purpose of prohibiting a person from placing or procuring another to place a camera on real property for purposes of conducting deliberate surreptitious observation of persons inside a private residence on the property under certain circumstances; prohibiting certain persons from conducting or procuring another to conduct visual surveillance with a certain intent in certain private places; providing that ownership is not a defense under certain circumstances; providing a certain defense; providing certain penalties; providing for a civil cause of action; providing certain exceptions; providing that this Act does not abrogate or limit certain other remedies; providing for the application of this Act; defining certain terms; and generally relating to use of cameras and visual surveillance.
