- (a) Review the existing reimbursement formula to ensure it reflects the current and planned requirements of the nursing home program under Medicaid and the care needs of the residents:
- (b) Review the proposed funding appropriation for Fiscal Year 2002 and Fiscal Year 2003 and make recommendations for changes to the reimbursement formula to ensure that the intent of Section 1 of this Act is achieved; and
- (c) Report its findings to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Environmental Matters Committee, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, on or before December 1, 2000.

SECTION 2-3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2000.
