S.B. 329 VETOES

Administration from sending information about the obligor to the Motor Vehicle Administration if specified grounds exist.

House Bill 605, which was passed by the General Assembly and signed by me on May 26, 2004, accomplishes the same purpose. Therefore, it is not necessary for me to sign Senate Bill 329.

AN ACT concerning

Child Support - Driver's License Suspension - Grounds for Contesting Requesting an Investigation and Appealing

FOR the purpose of establishing certain grounds on which a child support obligor may contest request an investigation and appeal the proposed action of the Child Support Enforcement Administration to send a notice to the Motor Vehicle Administration that the child support obligor is more than a certain number of days out of compliance with the most recent court order in making child support payments: requiring the Child Support Enforcement Administration to send a copy of the obligor's request for an investigation to the obligee, give the obligee a reasonable opportunity to respond, and consider the obligee's response; prohibiting the Child Support Enforcement Administration from sending information about the obligor to the Motor Vehicle Administration if certain grounds exist; establishing certain grounds on which a child support obligor may contest and appeal the suspension of the obligor's license and privilege to drive; providing that an obliger may not contest the suspension of the obliger's license or privilege to drive if the action has been previously contested in a certain manner; altering a limitation regarding the issues that may be considered at a certain hearing; making it discretionary, rather than mandatory, for the Child Support Enforcement Administration to send a notice to the Motor Vehicle Administration; and generally relating to child support and driver's license suspensions.
