I, John Davis of Dorchester County in the State of Maryland, in consideration of the sum of thirty five hundred dollars paid me by Jacob Willey, of the same County and State of aforesaid, do hereby bargain and sell to the said Jacob Willey, the following property, to wit: one Crop of Corn now growing on the Ground on Mrs. Neal's farm, one Crop of Corn now growing on the Ground on the farm now occupied by George Willey, one mule, and dark bay Horse called Bates, and Carriage and harness, and lot of oats, four hundred cords of wood now cut in the woods a part of which is on the farm now in the occupancy of George Willey, and a part on Dr. Francis D.
