Be it remembered and it is hereby certified, that the following Bill of Sale, was received and recorded on the 13th the June 1859, to wit: I, Williamo Griffine, free negro, of Dorchester County, Maryland, being now indebted to Dennis Campers, also free negro, of said County in the sum of Twenty five dollars with the interest from the first day of May 1859, in consideration thereof do hereby bargain and sell to the said Dennis Campers, the following property, all my rights and title to the Crops of Corn, now growing and the land I cultivate belonging to Gen^l S. Dail. Provided, that if the said Williamo Griffine, shall pay to the said Dennis Campers, the said sum of Twenty five dollars with the interest thereon on or before the 1st day of December 1859, then these presents shall be void. Witness my hand and seal, this 13th the day of June 1859. —



Be it remembered and it is hereby certified that the following Bill of Sale was received and recorded on the 1st January 1859 to wit: — We Thomas J. Frazier and Sarah C. Frazier of Dorchester County in the State of Maryland, in consideration of the sum of Two hundred and Twenty five dollars, paid us by Josiah Helby of the County and State aforesaid, do hereby bargain and sell to the said Josiah Helby, one negro slave called Gaius Small to serve as a slave until the Eleventh day of June Eighteen hundred and Seventy Seven and then to be free, The said negro Gaius Small being a slave for the period hereinafore mentioned and no longer, and the said Thomas J. Frazier and Sarah C. Frazier being entitled to the said slave for the whole of said term.
