(b) (1) By December 31, 1989 the Department shall consistent with the goals established in § 8-1202 of this [title] SUBTITLE adopt by regulation standards and procedures for the mitigation of nontidal wetlands losses, including practices for nontidal wetland creation, restoration, enhancement, or monetary compensation.

(b) If funds are not available to any county named in [§ 8-1310 (a)] § 8-1303 of this subtitle under Program Open Space, the Department shall include in the Department's budget a request for funds to acquire land within the county for the purposes stated in this subtitle. The funds, when appropriated, shall be matched by the respective appropriate county governing body or its duly designated agency to acquire land or other property shown or recommended on the Watershed plan for the designated public purposes. The budget request shall itemize the Watershed land acquisition program of each county or its duly designated agency, showing total acreage proposed to be acquired during the coming fiscal year, together with an estimate of funds to be made available by each county for the acquisition.

(b) The General Assembly declares that the Chesapeake Bay and THE TIDEWATER PORTIONS OF its tributaries [(within the tidewater portions of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries)] are a great natural asset and resource to the State and its counties. Portions of these areas are threatened with inundation by the unconfined dumping of vast quantities of spoil from dredging operations within Baltimore Harbor and certain dumpings of sewage sludge. This inundation and unconfined dumping will pollute and despoil valuable portions of the bottomland in the Chesapeake Bay and its tidewater tributaries and be grossly harmful to fish and marine life in these and adjacent waters, to use for recreation, and to the economic and social life of the people of this State.
