

(C) IF LICENSED IN ANOTHER STATE THAT DOES NOT HAVE A CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENT EQUIVALENT TO THOSE CONTAINED IN § 8-308(D) OF THIS SUBTITLE, AN APPLICANT SHALL, WITHIN 6 MONTHS AFTER BEING ISSUED A LICENSE IN THIS STATE, COMPLETE A PRESCRIBED NUMBER OF HOURS OF CONTINUING EDUCATION AS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD, NOT TO EXCEED 20 HOURS, AS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD SO AS TO OBTAIN AN EQUIVALENT NUMBER OF HOURS AS IS REQUIRED FOR IN-STATE APPLICANTS.

[(c)] (D) Except as provided by this section, the Board may not impose on an individual who applies for a waiver of examination any licensing requirement that is not required of any other applicant for a license.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 1991.

**CHAPTER 154**

**(House Bill 155)**

AN ACT concerning

**Hazardous Substances – Regulation and Enforcement**

FOR the purpose of clarifying certain provisions of law relating to hazardous substances and controlled hazardous substances; altering certain definitions; providing that the Department of the Environment shall adopt by regulation a revised Hazardous Substance Response Plan; providing that the State shall seek certain recovery of costs against certain responsible persons; requiring certain persons to provide certain information relating to a hazardous substance to the Department under certain circumstances; authorizing the Secretary to issue orders or seek injunctive relief against certain persons under certain circumstances; providing certain penalties for certain violations in which a person knowingly endangers another person; providing certain criteria for certain determinations under this Act; increasing certain civil, administrative civil, and criminal penalties; and generally relating to the regulation and enforcement of hazardous substances.
