(c) (1) A vehicle may not be driven on any highway if the width of the vehicle exceeds the limits specified in this subsection, unless:

(i) It has a permit issued by the State Highway Administration under § 24-112 of this subtitle; or

(ii) As to a highway under the jurisdiction of a local authority, it has special permission from the local authority.

(2) For a motor vehicle loaded with tobacco hogsheads or sod, the width limit is [103] 102 inches.

(3) For a bus on any highway that is part of the interstate system or State primary system, the width limit is 102 inches.

(4) For a truck or combination of vehicles, the width limit is 102 inches, provided:

[(i) It has a registered or operating gross weight of 33,000 pounds or more; and

(ii)] (I) It is being operated on any part of the interstate system or other State system highways that are designated by the Secretary in conjunction with the U.S. Department of Transportation; or

[(iii)](II) It is being operated on a highway that is the shortest practical route between a designated highway and a truck terminal, a point of origin/destination for cargo, or for a distance not to exceed 1 mile, facilities for food, fuel, repairs, or rest.

(5) For any other vehicle, the width limit is 96 inches.

(j) Except as otherwise provided in this section:

(1) In a combination of vehicles with a power unit that is a cargo-carrying vehicle, the overall length of the combination may not exceed 55 feet;

(2) Any other combination of vehicles may not exceed 55 feet; and

(3) (i) 1. A truck or truck tractor and semitrailer combination designed for and engaged exclusively in the transportation of automobiles or boats AND maxi-cube vehicles[, and saddle-mount and full-mount combinations] may not exceed 65 feet in length; and

2. A stinger-steered automobile transporter AND SADDLE-MOUNT AND FULL-MOUNT COMBINATIONS may not exceed 75 feet in length;
