

(D) PRINTING AND DISTRIBUTION OF MATERIAL.

(1) THE SECRETARY SHALL PRINT:

(I) THIS TITLE;

(II) EACH ANNUAL REPORT THAT THE SECRETARY SUBMITS TO THE GOVERNOR; AND

(III) ANY OTHER MATERIAL THAT THE SECRETARY CONSIDERS RELEVANT AND SUITABLE.

(2) ON REQUEST BY ANY PERSON, THE SECRETARY SHALL GIVE THE PERSON A COPY OF:

(I) ANY MATERIAL THAT THE SECRETARY PRINTS UNDER THIS SUBSECTION; AND

(II) THE CURRENT REGULATIONS ADOPTED TO CARRY OUT THIS TITLE.

REVISOR'S NOTE: This section is new language derived without substantive change from former Art. 95A, § 12(c)(1) the first and second sentences of (d) and the reference in the fourth sentence to bonding of employees, and, the second sentence of (a) as that sentence related to adoption of regulations, and the second sentence of § 11(a)(1).

In subsection (a) of this section, the former words "amend" and "rescind" are deleted as unnecessary since "regulation", as defined in SG § 10-101(e), includes "an amendment or repeal of a statement". Regulations adopted under this section are subject to Title 10, Subtitle 1 of the State Government Article. Accordingly, former Art. 95A, § 12(b), which required the Secretary to adopt regulations "in the manner prescribed by the State Documents Law", is deleted as incomplete. Chapter 284, Acts of 1984, incorporated the former State Documents Law into Title 10, Subtitle 1 of the State Government Article. See the General Revisor's Note to that article.

In subsection (b)(1) of this section, the former reference to "certification by" the "State Commissioner of Personnel" is deleted as unnecessary in light of the general reference to Art. 64A of the Code.

Subsection (c) of this section is revised to state that the Secretary shall determine which employees need to be bonded. The Maryland State Employee Surety Bond Committee then determines the type and amount of the bond. See Art. 78A, §§ 46 through 50 of the Code.

In the introductory language of subsection (d)(1) of this section, the words "shall print" are substituted for the former words "shall cause to be printed", for brevity. The former words were unnecessary since ministerial duties are inherently delegable.
