(a) [Unless] EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED IN THIS TITLE, UNLESS a person is licensed under this title, the person may not [represent to the public that the person is] PRACTICE AS a registered environmental sanitarian.

(b) Unless a person is licensed under this title, the person may not use the title "registered environmental sanitarian" or the initials "R.S." after the name of the person OR ANY OTHER TITLE WITH THE INTENT TO REPRESENT THAT THE PERSON IS LICENSED TO PRACTICE AS A REGISTERED ENVIRONMENTAL SANITARIAN.

Subject to the evaluation and reestablishment provisions of the Program Evaluation Act, the provisions of this title and of any rule or regulation adopted under this title shall terminate and be of no effect after [July 1, 1993] JULY 1, 2003.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, on or before December 1, 1992, the State Board of Environmental Sanitarians shall study and report to the House Environmental Matters Committee and the Senate Economic and Environmental Affairs Committee on recommendations for expanding the educational opportunities and programs available in Maryland for training environmental sanitarians.

SECTION ~~2~~ 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 1992.

Dear Mr. President:

In accordance with Article II, Section 17 of the Maryland Constitution, I have today vetoed Senate Bill 510.

This bill would authorize the Board of Community College Trustees for Howard County to borrow money for the acquisition of interests in personal property to be used for the operation of Howard Community College.

House Bill 51, which was passed by the General Assembly and signed by me on May 12, 1992, accomplished the same purpose and applied to the Howard, Montgomery, and Prince George's Counties' Boards of Trustees, while Senate Bill 510 applied only to the Howard County Board. Therefore, it is not necessary for me to sign Senate Bill 510.
