## Preamble

WHEREAS, The State's Interagency Plan for Transitioning Youth with Disabilities calls for comprehensive, coordinated interagency planning to occur between school and adult services at the State and local levels in order to translate into meaningful outcomes for young people with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, The State's Interagency Plan for Transitioning Youth with Disabilities sets objectives to:

- (1) establish a coordinated data collection and reporting system that accurately identifies the needs of transitioning students and promotes adequate service delivery capacities; and
- (2) increase collaboration with other organizations responsible for transitioning students with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, The federal Individuals with Disabilities <u>Education</u> Act (IDEA) recognizes the importance of interagency planning and coordination by requiring individual transition plans for students with disabilities to include the appropriate adult service agencies; and

WHEREAS, Local school systems currently are linked to the State Department of Education and provide transition and related information; now, therefore,

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

## **Article - Education**

- (a) (1) In this section the following words have the meanings indicated.
- (2) "Plan" means the Interagency State Plan for Transitioning Students with Disabilities.
- (3) "Transition services" means a coordinated set of activities for a student with a disability who meets the definition of a transitioning student that promotes movement from school to postschool activities, including postsecondary
