which shall be semi-annually ascertained and certified on the books of the concern by all of the partners."

On motion by Mr. M'Culloh, the following was added to the bill:

"And be it enacted, That every partnership, or firm, that shall be established in virtue of this act, shall annually take out a licence, from the clerk of the county court of the county in which such partnership shall be formed; and for which they shall pay a tax, to the use of the state, at the time of obtaining the law from said clerk, at the rate of one half of one per centum on the capital furnished by the special partners to said partnership."

Mr. Kennedy moved that the bill, with the amendments, be recommitted, printed, and made the order of the day for Tuesday next.
