Resolved. That William Robertson, of Montgomery county, be, and he is hereby discharged from the payment of the sum of two hundred and eighty-nine dollars and ninety-six cents, part of a sum at which improvements were valued, by the surveyor of Montgomery county, on two small parcels of land called "Unimportant?" and "All Important," lying in said county.

Resolved. That the register of the land office, be, and he is hereby directed, to issue to said William Robertson, a patent for said parcels of land, on his paying such part of the residue of said valuation, as has

not yet been paid to the state.

Which was twice read by special order, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The bill to authorize the use of the testimony of the parties as witnesses in trials at law, was read the second time.

Mr. Kilgour moved the following as an additional section:

"And be it enacted, That nothing in this act shall be construed to compel any person to give evidence for or against himself in a court of common law." Determined in the negative.

The committee to whom were referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of Somerset county, praying that a part of the donation granted to Washington academy, in said county, may be given to Salisbury academy in the town of Salisbury, have had the same under consideration,
