Mr. Williams moved the following message:

By the House of Delegates, Feb. 18, 1826.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

When a number of individuals, associated for the purpose of conducting any business with a view to their private benefit, ask for a charter securing to them, for a long period of time, privileges greaterthan those which they have a right to enjoy in common with other citizens of the state, and exempting them altogether from individual responsibilities to which other citizens are personally liable by law, we conceive it to be but right and proper that the legislature, granting such charter, should stipulate with the company, soliciting the same, for a reasonable bonus to the use of the state, as a consideration therefor. Hence we consider it just, as well as expedient, to insert in the bill to incorporate the Maryland, Delaware and Pennsylvania Steam Navigation Company, that section which was to make the continuance of their charter depend upon the payment of a certain sum annually into the treasury. We regret, therefore, that we cannot concur with you in your proposition to amend the bill by striking out that section; but we are willing, if you please, so to modify the amendment, that the bonus shall be regulated by the profits that may be earned, instead of its being fixed at a certain sum, or levied on the capital of the company. We would agree to amend the section referred to, in such manner that the bonus should be proportioned to the number of passengers that may be conveyed in the boats of the said company across the Chesapeake bay, and propose twenty-five cents as the rate to be paid into the treasurv of Maryland for each passenger that may be so as aforesaid conveved.

We return you the bill herewith, in the hope that upon a reconsideration of it, you will agree either to pass it in its present form, or with an amendment similar to that which we have respectfully suggested.
