Mr. Tyson reports a bill, entitled, An act supplementary to an act, entitled, A supplement to an act relating to justices of the peace in the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Tyson presents a petition from David C. White, counter to the petition of Ann White, his wife, praying a divorce; referred to the committee on the same subject.

The bill for the benefit of the stockholders of the Susquehanna bridge was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Beckett, the question was put, That the same be referred to the 1st of June next? Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Williams moved to suspend the rule, for the purpose of introducing the following order:

Ordered, That the bills severally entitled, An act to create a board of public works, and An act for the promotion of internal improvement, be and the same are hereby made the business of the day for Saturday next, and that the same be called up for consideration on that day, and shall have preference over all other business whatsoever, until the said bills be finally disposed of by this house.

Resolved in the affirmative.

The order was then adopted.

The house adjourns until to morrow morning 10 o'clock.

Friday, February 24, 1826.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill for the relief of Elizabeth Hammond, the wife of Johnsa Hammond, of Washington county, was sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of Lambert Beard, with the message relative thereto, was sent to the senate.

Mr. Stevens presents a petition from sundry citizens of Queen-Anne's county, praying to be relieved from unnecessary suits on joint bonds; read and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Thomas, the question was put, That leave be given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to withdraw the donations from the several colleges and academies in this state, and subject the same to the appropriation of the legislature, for the internal improvement of the state, and not for other or different purposes.
