

Washington county; the bill for the relief of Susannah G. Edmonson, were severally read, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill authorising and requiring the erection of indexes and finger boards, in Frederick county, was read the second time.

Washington and Allegany being inserted, the title was amended, and the bill passed and sent to the senate.

Mr Boon delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the bill from the senate entitled, An act to authorise the trustees of the poor of Kent county, to purchase a farm or tract of land for the use of the poor, and to sell the present alms house of said county, and for other purposes, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to recommend the passage of the same by this house without amendment.

Mr. McCulloh reported the bill to regulate the manner of obtaining and altering public roads in Baltimore county, without amendment.

The bill to confirm and make valid the acts of Joseph Bryan, a justice of the peace in Cecil county, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the benefit of the heirs of Joseph C. Ireland, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate returns the bill for the support of James M. Carty, and the bill for the benefit of Richard Mason, severally endorsed "will not pass."

Also the supplement to an act, entitled, An act appointing commissioners for the regulation and improvement of the village of Hillsborough, in Caroline county; the bill for the relief of the heirs at law of Lawrence O'Neale; the bill regulating fences in Harford county; and the bill to make valid a deed of manumission executed by William Moffitt, late of Kent county, deceased, severally endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

Also the act supplementary to an act to regulate lotteries, endorsed "reconsidered and will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read.

And a communication from the honourable the executive, enclosing a resolution from the legislature of Maine, disapproving of the amendment to the constitution of the United States proposed by the general assembly of Tennessee, on the 25th of November last.

Also the bill for settling the western limits of this state, and the dividing line and boundary between this state and the commonwealth of Virginia, endorsed "will not pass."

And delivers a resolution in favour of the visitors and governors of St. John's College, endorsed "assented to;" which was read.
