Resolved in the affirmative.

The resolution relative to Strickland's Reports was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The supplement to the act relative to licenses, was read the second time.

Mr. Thomas moved the following to be added to the bill:

And be it enacted, That any tavern keeper, moving into and occupying a tavern, shall be permitted to use the license that the former occupant was entitled to use, for the balance of the year for which such license or permit was obtained; any thing in this act to the contrary notwithstanding.

Mr. Kennedy moved the following as a substitute:

“And be it enacted, That in case of the decease of any ordinary keeper, the widow or children may continue to keep such ordinary for the remainder of the year, without taking out any new licence. Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Garner moved to add the following:

Provided the said widow or children, as the case may be, shall enter into a sufficient recognizance for the correct discharge of their duties as ordinary keepers. Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Duvall, the following was added:

“And be it enacted, That nothing in this act shall extend to repeal an act passed this session, relating to the proprietors and occupants of the shad and herring fisheries on the Potomac, from the first of April to the 20th day of May.

On motion by Mr. Thomas, the following was added:

“And be it enacted, That the occupants of established shad and herring fisheries on all the rivers at the head of the Chesapeake bay, shall be entitled to the same privileges that are granted to the fisheries on the Potomac.”

The bill was then passed, and sent to the senate,
