On motion by Mr. Semmes, the following was added: And be it enacted, that from and after the passage of this act, that it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to draw, or cause to be drawn, any lottery or lotteries in this state, or to sell or to dispose of, or offer to sell or dispose of, any lottery ticket or lottery tickets, in any lottery, whether authorised by this state or not, unless on application to the lottery commissioners, the said commissioners shall certify under their hands and seals, that such lottery or lotteries are authorised by the laws of this state, and that the grant or grants are not exhausted or forfeited, and this certificate to be filed in the treasury office of the western shore of Maryland, and the treasurer and lottery commissioners are hereby authorised and directed, to perform all the duties necessary to carry the provisions of this act into effect.

And be it enacted. That if any person or persons shall violate this law, he, she or they, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$10,000, or imprisonment in the penitentiary, not exceeding four

years.

And be it enacted, That upon information being given to the attorney general, he shall cause all necessary proceedings to be instituted in any of the courts of this state, necessary to the prosecution and conviction of all offenders under this act; provided, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the sale of tickets in a lottery authorised by the state of Virginia, for the disposal of the property of Thomas Jefferson, or the lottery or lotteries authorised by the laws of this state, for the benefit of the University of Maryland, by whatsoever names or titles the same may be known or called.
