 release from slavery liberate manumitted and set free  
 my negro woman named Fanny Williams being of  
 the age of thirty nine years and her children named  
 Louisa, Matilda, George, John, Eliza Ann and  
 her the said negro woman named Fanny Williams  
 and her children aforesaid I do declare to be henceforth  
 free manumitted and discharged from all services of  
 chattels or services to me my Executors or administrators  
 forever. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set  
 my hand and affixed my seal this 20<sup>th</sup> day of October  
 in the year of our Lord 1819.

And Anne Anne County of Beal remembered that  
 on this 20<sup>th</sup> day of October 1819. personally appeared William  
 Brewer party to the within instrument appearing before  
 me the subscriber, a Justice of the peace of the State of  
 Maryland for the said County and acknowledges the  
 same to be his act and deed for the purposes within  
 mentioned and the negro woman within named to be  
 henceforth manumitted and discharged from all services  
 to him or to any claiming under him and to be free and  
 manumitted according to the act of a Assembly in such cases  
 made and provided. Acknowledged before James Hunter  
 Recorded the 20<sup>th</sup> day of October 1819.

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
