At which said Report to wit the Nineteenth day of March Anno Domini 1722 before the Said John
Smith who was appointed to inspect & road aforesaid makes Report thereof as follows vizt

In Submission to the Good Order I have Inspected the Said Road, and do find that the same is
good and sufficient for Travellers and all others Persons that may be considered as within my hand -
John Smith

Therefore it is Considered by the Justices here that & road aforesaid Inspected by the Said John Smith according
to & Report aforesaid be and continue the high road according to Est^t aforesaid

Samuel Hitch - } So the worshg full Justices now Setting the Humble petition of Samuel Hitch, Sheweth that your
Est^t aforesaid
William Read - } Ediliion formerly was bound an apprentice unto a certaine William Read, late of Somersett County
But now of Dorchester County, a servant unto a certaine John Rider Gentleman and your Ediliion is not
Kept as an apprentice ought to be, according to his Indenture - Therefore Cray your Worshg. will take it
into your wise Consideration and Order the Said Road to Comply with your Ediliions Indenture or he cannot
Subsist which being duly Considered your Ediliion or in duty bound shall Cray Sam^t Hitch

On the Back of the foregoing Est^t it was then ordered thus -
Samuel Hitch's Petition granted and Ordered that he stay with his father Adam Hitch till June Court and
if William Read shall then appear and give good Security for Employment with his Indenture or other
way he will be discharged from his Service - Signed by Brodr Alex^d Hale Esq^r.

Sundry the Inhabitants } Upon the Petition of Sundry the Inhabitants of Somersett County for the keeping a publick

to keep Ferry - Bridges, where your Worshg. shall think fit - whereon the Court having Maturall
considered the same do agree with a certaine George Hutchins to keep a publick Ferry over the aforesaid
River, from Thomas Goddards Landing to his own, the said George Hutchins paying, and providing a sufficient
Boat fitting to convey man and horse over the said Ferry, and to give good attendance thereto - In considera
tion whereof the said George Hutchins is to be allowed after date of two thousand pounds of sterl^r per year.

such manner as that she hath beene totally uncapable of doing any thing being deprivid of her Senses and
your Ediliion has sundry small children to manag^r, so that he is under such circumstances as that he
is not able to apply himselfe to a doctor for cure of his wife without lettirly burdening himselfe
humbly Cray your Worshg. will shew your Charity towards the care of the said Mary by so
allowance as in duty bound to shall Cray C^r Hugh M^t Colligan.
