Whereas Your Petitioner hath an old impudent Negro woman who goes almost double being almost past Labour and is now become burthenome to Your Petitioner who praye your worshipps Consideration on my case, that if your worshipps can be timely informed of the truth of my Petition you will please to Set her tax free and your Petitioner shall as in duty bound pray

The Petition aforesaid being Read and heard and the Premises Considered. It is therefore Ordered by the Court that the Negro aforesaid of the aforesaid John Gunby be for the future Tax free per-

Elizabeth Fowler servant of Thomas Fowler aged ten years the twentieth, with
bound to John Evans Servt. day of February last Past is bound by the Court unto John Evans Servt. while
she arrives to the age of Sixteen years. the said Elizabeth Fowler to serve
the said John Evans the full term of nine aforesaid. In consideration of which Service the
said John Evans doth oblig his self by these presents to pay the said Elizabeth Fowler
to Read, and to find and Provide for her all such Necessaries as should be sufficient for such
a servant to live and wear during her Service aforesaid &c.

Custom of goodnes, Justice and Charitie to Considerate your poor Petitioner he being Dispossesse
