August the Nineteenth day and Dow<sup>d</sup>. One thousand Seven hundred and Twenty five then came into  
Court certain Indians belonging to the Indian Town on Coomoke and did then and there make complaint  
before the Worshipfull Sam<sup>t</sup> Hopkins Gentleman and his Associates Justices of the Peace Court Judicially  
Sitting that Several of the Inhabitants Lying in and Near the said Town that had horses and Mares did  
trayp upon them the Said Indians, by breaking into their corn fields and eating the same &c.

Whereupon It is Ordered by the Court that the Same Indians made a posse or posse in  
the said Town and putt in all such horses and mares as they shall find trayping at any time but if  
further it is Ordered that the said Indians Impounding any such horses or mares as aforesaid on them  
trayping that they the said Indians Shall give the Owner of such horses or Mares due Notice  
according to Law & —

William — White son of Stevens White late of Somersett County Gentleman being  
of full age according to Law for the Chosing his Guardian comes into Court and prays that he may  
be admitted to chose William Whittington of Somersett County Esq; his Guardian which is Granted &

Whereupon the said William Whittington having all the Estate of the Said William —  
White in his hands both lease and personal It is Ordered by the Court that the Said William  
Whittington give good Security unto the said William — White with the Law in Every respect  
Relating to Guardian ship of him —

Whereupon the Said William Whittington together  
with Joseph McClester and Hugh Carter — of Somersett County present here in Court acknowledg-  
ed themselves to owe and stand Justly Indebted unto the aforesaid William — White his heirs  
and affique in the sume of twelve hundred pounds <sup>mons of Great Brittan</sup> Sterl; <sup>and</sup> to pay all debts  
their bodies goods or chattels lands or tenements to be levied for the use of the said Will-

— White — In case the Said William Whittington do not in Every Respect comply with  
the Law in Relation to his indenture <sup>and</sup> Likewise do not deliver up the <sup>to the</sup> land <sup>of his estate</sup> to <sup>as</sup> the <sup>when</sup> said <sup>legally</sup> demanded <sup>quately</sup> and  
peaceably <sup>and</sup> without any molestation or disturbance whatsoever then —

Jobai Burke — And the Said Jobai Burke by George Dashie his attorney appears and produces to  
the Court here his Lordship's Writ of Error which being read and heard it is Order-  
ed by the Court here that a full transcript of the proceedings in the plea before the  
Court be made and sent according to Stent and command of the Sheriff in England to which Order of Name I have
