that now belongs to John Woolford and he always observed that <sup>to be</sup> called Woolfords Gutt and as he walked  
from George Bormans he used to go through the Great pasture this deponent being asked what the Gutt was called  
that runs up by Lewis Woolfords plantation his answer that Gutt was called Lewis Gutt and further saith

March: 9: 1731 } John Tunstall aged fifty one year or thereabout being sworn on the holy Evangelists  
of Almighty God saith that about twenty nine years ago Samuel Worthington bought ahd of  
Rum of Mr Wilson (who had the management of Capt Woodrives business) and that this deponent  
brought the hhd. of Rum to a Landing on the River and that he was told that they had better brought  
it to the Great pasture Gutt Geo. Roger Woolford was then at his mothers and this deponent agreed  
therein that that Gutt was the Gutt that runs next to Mr Woolfords house for the best Landing and this  
deponent further saith that Daniel Burgen told him that he went often to see his Shipmate one  
Anthony Smith a weaver who was a servant to Mr Woolfords and they went often fishing in the  
Great pasture Gutt, a Gutt that runs up by the house where Woolford did then live and further this  
deponent saith not. . . . .
