of the County aforesaid to Examine Witnesses in relation to the bounds of a tract of Land called Barstable

The deposition of John Bunnell son of Somerset County aforesaid Gent. aged Sixty
years or thereabouts being by us sworn upon the holy Evangelist of Almighty God deposeseth and
saith that a dead Red Oak now in his sight standing by the Side of a small Savannah near the
head of Mattapony Creek is one of the bounds of a tract of Land formerly Surveyed for Daniel
Selby called Bantrey the bounds of which was sometime since ascertained by Commissioners appointed
by act of assembly and this deponent further saith that he verily believes the aforesaid
tree to be the first boundary of the aforesaid Land called Barstable because the true first courses from
the aforesaid tree are the same with the western bounds of the aforesaid Land called Bantrey as will appear
by the deed of the aforesaid Land called Barstable and further saith not —
