The petition aforesaid being read and heard and fully understood and mature deliberation thereupon had - Wherefore it is considered and ordered by the Justices here that David Wilson William Fingui Jeffrey Long and John Waters of Somerset County Gentlemen shall be appointed at the place aforesaid, and lay out and clear down the track between said road and another from the road that leads from the bridge to the place aforesaid through the middle thereof, the said road to be laid out of most convenience, and least of prejudice to any persons whatsoever, and the same new road so as to be laid out, to be cleared surveyed and kept good by the said David Wilson and Jeffrey Long overseer of the road, and their laborers &c

Belth ... } The petition aforesaid being read and heard and fully understood and mature deliberation thereupon had - Whereas your humble petitioner about two years ago bought negro man which by the hand of Providence hath been afflicted with Scurvy in both his arms and in one of his legs whereby he is disabled from doing any service or to feed himself or to put on his clothes to the great damage of your petitioner and being a great way from Court and could not bring him before the said Justices Court the said petitioner brought him before your worshipful Justices and your humble petitioner prays that he may be released from paying long for the aforesaid Negro, and your petitioner as in duty bound shall ever pray - The petition aforesaid being read and heard and fully understood and mature deliberation thereupon had - Wherefore it is considered by the Justices here that the said John Quaker be discharged for the future from paying of taxes for the Negro aforesaid as by the petition aforesaid is made &c

UPON the motion of Lewis Gale of Somerset County Esq. and Clerk of the Indictments for the County aforesaid to have liberty to exhibit an Information against William Phillip Selby of the County aforesaid Gentleman for fleeing, or selling absconding on the aforesaid of William Selby, contrary to the act of assembly in such force made and provided - Wherefore it is considered by the Justices here that the said Lewis Gale have liberty to exhibit an Information against the aforesaid William Selby as by the said motion is made &c

Belth ... } The humble Petition of John Fulk Kinsale ... that your petitioner is possessed with a small tract of Land whereon there is but very little that is plantable and your petitioner being deprived of the benefit of the same by reason of the County Road running thro' the best of your petitioners Land so that it is impossible your petitioner can make bread sufficient for himself and family's sustenance your petitioner is willing to bear an other Road as good as the new great Road on the lower side of your petitioners plantation therefore your petitioner humbly prays your worshipful will be pleased to take the same into consideration and prays your worshipful will give order for the removing the same &c and your petitioner as in duty bound will pray

The petition aforesaid being read and heard and fully understood and mature deliberation thereupon had - Wherefore it is considered by the Justices here that the said John Fulk have liberty to have the Road as by the petition aforesaid is made, to be laid out as good and as profitable as the old &c

The Justices here according to act of assembly in such force made and provided, took the oath appointed by the same act of assembly for Judges and Justices to be taken, and took their places on the bench &c
Edward Kellum appointed Overseer of the Roads in Nantuxke Hundred in the stead of Gabriel Goyer and to John and George Rounding his usual assistants &c
