Cap^t William Turpin aged fifty ^{three} years or thereabouts deposes on the holy Evangelist of Almighty God that about twenty four or five years since he this deponant havinge In brumamed with the Daughter of Mr^r Richard Whitty who was heir to the Land called Colebrook, he was present at the Enquirey of a Jury into the bounds of the afo^r Land called Colebrook and Remembres that Geo: The bus and W^m Walter being Sworn did say that Mr^r Robert Whitty now Deist allways Acknowledged the white oak tree mentioned to stand on a point near to the mouth of a small Glade Issues out of Goose Creek a little below William Jones house where this deponant now stands and where there is this day an umbery post marked with Pickers notches put up near a dead Red Oak Saplin markt (as the uppermost bounder of Colebrook or Whittys Land aforesaid) taken before us this 15th Day of may ann^d 1731

Thomas Dashiell aged Sixty five years or thereabouts deposes on the holy Evangelist of Almighty God that about twenty four or five years since as near as this deponant can remember he was on a Jury with Robert Lasl and some others to Enquire into the bounds of a tract of Land called Colebrook formerly in the possession of Richard Whitty at what time they came to a point on Goose Creek a little below Wm Jones house near to the mouth of a glad where there now stands a dead Red oak Saplin markt near to what Geo: The bus being Sworn did say stood a markt white oak tree with Mr^r Whitty or his Master whitty did always acknowledge as his uppermost bounder of Colebrook and that William Walter being Sworn said that he well Remem ber that Mr^r Whitty did Acknowledge the above white oak as his uppermost Bounder of Colebrook And further this Deponant saith that George Bets was sworn at the time and place aforesaid who Declared that as he was passing by along the Road opposite to the point where this Deponant now stands in company with Owen (Magrow)
