Mr. Goldsborough from the committee on colored population, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to enable Theodorick Bland, to bring certain slaves into this state, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and were of opinion it ought not to pass.

It was read the second time.

Mr. Goldsborough from the committee on colored population, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to authorise and empower Elizabeth Duvall, executrix of Grafton B. Duvall, of Anne Arundel county, to sell and dispose of her negro man William Philips, who is a slave only for a term of years, beyond the limits of this state, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second time.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered the following resolutions:

A resolution granting the use of the Library to certain persons therein mentioned,

Which was read the first time and referred to the committee on the library.

A resolution relative to the publication and distribution of the laws,

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Ricaud, Schley and Wright.

Also the following bills:

A bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road in Carroll and Anne Arundel counties,

Which was read the first time, and referred to Messrs. Brown, Kent and Beckett.
