It was read the second time.

On motion of Mr. Bowie,

It was ordered that 111 copies of the report of the board of managers for removing people of color, be printed for the use of the General Assembly.

On motion of Mr. Purnell,

It was ordered that 500 copies of the reports of the Geologist and the Topographical Engineer, be printed for the use of the General Assembly.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered a resolution in favor of Kitturah Wall,

Which was read the first time and referred to the committee on revolutionary claims.

And returned the resolution which originated in the senate, requesting the Governor to issue a commission to the Hon. John S. Spence, endorsed, assented to.

The bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the widow and children of Hugh Anderson, late of the city of Balti-
