Which was read and dissented from:

By the Senate,

March 2, 1837.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We respectfully ask you to send back to the Senate, the two bills which originated in the Senate, entitled, 'an act relating to the Executive Department of the Government of this State, and to alter and abolish all such parts of the Constitution and Form of Government, as may be inconsistent with its provisions;' and a bill entitled, 'an act relating to the Legislative Department of the Government of this State, and to repeal so much of the Constitution and Form of Government, as may be inconsistent with its provisions.'

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered a resolution relating to the donation to Lower Marlborough Academy.

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Beckett, Kent and Goldsborough.

Also, the following bills:

A bill entitled, an act to provide for the building of a court house, clerks office, registers office, goal and poor house in Carroll county,
