

The following amendments were read and assented to:
To be added to the first section, at the end thereof.

And that it shall and may be lawful for the Sheriff of Washington county, to ask, demand and receive for keeping each prisoner in gaol, and finding him or her in victuals, thirty cents per day and no more, to be levied and collected as heretofore, any law or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

Add as an additional section.

Section 3. And be it enacted, that in lieu of the sum heretofore allowed according to the provisions of an act entitled, an act to provide for the support and maintenance of debtors actually confined in prison, the said Sheriff of Washington county, shall be allowed to charge, demand and receive 20 cents per day for the support and maintenance of every debtor arrested on a *capias ad satisfaciendum*, or for want of special bail or in any case whatever, where a sheriff is allowed to charge, demand and receive therefor the sum in the said act mentioned, to be paid according to the provisions of the said act entitled as aforesaid.

The bill was then read through and passed, and

On motion of Mr. Tidball,

The title of the bill was amended as follows:

Add the letter 's' to the word 'sheriff' in the first line and after the word 'county,' in the same line add the words 'and Washington county.'

The bill was then passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Purnell from the committee on finance, to which was referred the resolution in favor of Wm. H. Fitzhugh, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Wright from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the Sheriff of Queen Anne's county, and the bill entitled, a supplement to an act passed at December session 1833, chapter 110, reported favorably thereon.

They were severally read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the House of Delegates.
