The question was then put,

'Will the senate recede from the 2nd amendment of the senate?'

It was determined in the affirmative, and the bill re-

turned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Beckett from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to limit the time for which tobacco inspectors shall continue to hold their offices, reported fav orably thereon.

It was read the second time.

Mr. Goldsborough from the committee on colored population to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Binah Cook, a free woman of color, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second time.

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning at ten o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, March 8th, 1837.

The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion of Mr. Beckett,

The bill entitled, an act to limit the time for which Tobacco inspectors shall hold their offices, was read the third time, when

On motion of Mr. Cottman,

The following amendment was read.

Strike out all the bill after the enacting clause, and in-

sert as follows:

'That if at any time it be proved to the satisfaction of the Governor and Council, that there has been any impropriety of conduct on the part of any Tobacco Inspector now in commission, in the discharge of his office, it shall then be, and is hereby made the daily of the Executive to appoint some other competent individual to fill the said office.'

The question was put,

"Will the Senate assent to said amendment?"

The yeas and nays were asked for, and on taking them they appeared as follows:
