We submit for your consideration, a communication from David Hoffman, Esq. who was recently appointed by us, Director of the Digest of the Laws, &c. Vice James W. McCulloh, resigned.

The resolution of December session 1834, under which Mr. Hoffman was appointed, clothes the Executive with no other power than the appointments of Director and as-
