THURSDAY, March 9, 1837.

The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The message received yesterday from His Excellency Governor Veazey, covering a communication from David Hoffman, Esquire, in regard to the Digest of the Laws, &c. was sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Brown presented the memorial of Noble Pennington, late sheriff of Cecil county, praying that Cecil county court may be authorised to allow him to amend a special return therein mentioned,

Which was read and referred to the committee on judicial proceedings.

Mr. Kent from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for keeping in repair the public roads of Prince George's county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Kent from the committee on the militia, to which was referred the resolution relating to a fire-proof magazine, and

The resolution authorising captain Henry McKinnel to take possession of certain pieces of artillery, reported favorably thereon.

They were severally read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Hilleary from the committee on internal improvement to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a Turnpike road from the Town of Cumberland to the Pennsylvania line so as to intersect the Turnpike road from Bedford, in the direction of Cumberland, reported favorably thereon.
