On motion of Mr. Wright,

The bill estitled, an act in relation to the driving of cattle and sheep through Kent county, was read the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Jones from the committee on corporations and joint stock companies to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Frestburg academy in Allegany county, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and were of opinion it ought not to pass.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Tidball,

The bill entitled, an act to unite the fifth and sixth Congressional districts into one district, was recommitted to Messrs Tidball, Jones and Brown.

Mr. Cottman from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to provide for the building a bridge across Laws thoroughfare in Somerset county, passed at December session 1834, chapter 26, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act to regulate the compensation of jurors, judges of the orphans court, judges of the levy court, commissioners of the Tax and witnesses for Caroline county, was read the third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Purnell from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to provide for building a bridge over Dividing creek, at a place called Denston's dams on the public road leading from Princess Anne in Somerset county, to Snow Hill in Worcester county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Goldsborough from the committee on colored population to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to authorise Edward Coppage of Queen Anne's county, to manumit certain negroes therein mentioned, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and were of opinion it ought not to pass.
