The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The message adopted by the Senate on yesterday, proposing that the members elect of the council, be informed by letter, of their re election, were sent to the House of Delegates.

On motion of Mr. Ricaud,

The following order was read and adopted:

Ordered, that the Senate now proceed to elect by ballot, and in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, an individual, resident of the Western Shore, as a Senator for the residue of the term for which John V. L. McMahan, Esq. was elected.

The Senate proceeded to the said election.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Samuel Jones, junior, of the city of Baltimore, was put in nomination.

The ballot box was prepared, and the ballots deposited therein, and on examination thereof by the clerk, it was ascertained there had been 12 votes given, all of which were for Samuel Jones, junior.
