Also the bill entitled, an act for the better regulation of the school districts in the upper election district of Caroline county, so far as relates to the school district number three;

Also the bill entitled, an act relating to Uhler's alley, in the city of Baltimore;

Also the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Samuel S. Hays, of Montgomery county, administrator of William Trail, deceased, severally endorsed 'will pass,' and the bills ordered to be engrossed;

Also the bill entitled, an act to divorce Peter Martin, of Allegany county, from his wife Maria Martin;

Also the bill entitled, an act to divorce Robert H. Galway, of the city of Baltimore, from his wife Margaret Galway;

Also the bill entitled, an act to enable Sarah Day, of Harford county, to bring into the State of Maryland, from Virginia, the negro slave therein mentioned;

Also the bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road through a part of Frederick and Carroll counties;

Also the bill entitled, an act to authorise William Powell, of Talbot county, to bring into this State certain slaves for a term of years, severally endorsed 'will not pass;'

Also the bill entitled, an act to ascertain the allowance of the sheriff of Somerset county, for keeping prisoners in jail, and to provide for the maintenance of debtors actually confined in prison, endorsed 'amendment receded from,' and the bill ordered to be engrossed;

And the bill entitled, an act to authorise Samuel Harman, a free man of color, of Worcester county, to set free his wife and children, who are his slaves for life, endorsed 'will pass with the proposed amendments;'
