as the first of the three propositions in said order was instantly revoked, and a substitute ordered for same.

This proclamation of the Governor to the people of the State, vindicating the rights of the electors, and the solemn and sworn duties of the judges of election, under the Constitution and laws, was attempted to be suppressed by military authority or action, and was, to a great extent, successfully suppressed, as the Governor in his message states, "that before the following morning (Tuesday, the third day of November,) military orders was sent to the Eastern Shore, directing its circulation to be suppressed; the public papers were forbidden to publish it, and an embargo was laid upon all steamers in port trading with that part of the State, lest they might carry it."

On Tuesday preceding the day of election, the following order was issued by Lieut. Colonel C. C. Tevis, and circulated in two of the counties on the shore, to wit, Kent and Queen Anne's, and which in direct language too plainly and painfully discloses the true secret of military interference with the proposed or contemplated elections, and which order is as follows:

Whereas, the President of the United States, in reply to a letter addressed to him by Hon. None other is recognized by the Federal authorities as loyal or worthy of the support of any one who desires the peace and restoration of this Union.
