Article, relating to the police and general powers of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, and repealing the 774th, 775th, 776th, and 777th sections of said Article, relating to the features of said city, and the power of the Mayor and City Council to establish and regulate the same, inserting in lieu thereof, the sections so repealed, the following sections:——; for the purpose of providing a permanent police for the city of Baltimore;

Was put upon its second reading.

Mr. Kimmel moved to strike out the enacting clause;

AMENDMENT PROPOSED:

After the word "thereunder," in the fifteenth line of the first section, add the words "provided, however, that if, in the said city, any church, chapel or convent, any dwelling house, any house used or designed by any person or any body corporate, as a place for the transaction of business or deposit of property, any ship, ship yard or lumber yard, any barn, stable or other out house, or any articles of personal property, shall be injured or destroyed, or if any property therein shall be taken away, injured or destroyed, by any riotous or tumultuous assemblage of people, the full amount of the damage so done shall not be recoverable by the sufferer or sufferers, by suit at law, against the said city of Baltimore."
