We have only given the number in the College Department. The number in the Preparatory Department for the last four years averaged 48—being respectively 29, 55, 52, 56.

The number of Graduates for the same period has been 67, beside at least one hundred others who have been fitted for the various avocations of life. The small number of Graduates is to be attributed to the fact, that in our active age so few will submit to the discipline of scholastic life for any long period. But many of those who do not complete the academic course, are well fitted for the highest positions in the State, as the present history of your own Body fully illustrates. Gratifying as numbers in a collegiate institution are, its true mission is only fulfilled in the character of her sons, of which a college that can boast of the proudest names of Maryland's own sons, need not be ashamed.

It would not be just to the educational power of the college, to submit this report without adding, that the institution under our charge has for the last three years been educating, *gratuitously*, for the respective years, 42, 35, and 37 poor young men.

3rd. “The number of Professors, with a statement of the pay and emoluments of each for the same period.”

During the period aforesaid, there have never been less than six instructors connected with the College, and a part of the time eight. We have at present seven. The pay and emoluments have varied from time to time in this period—from 1850 to 1855—the Principal received two thousand dollars, and each of the Professors one thousand—except the Professor of the Preparatory Department, who received seven hundred dollars. From 1855 to 1857, the Principal received fifteen hundred dollars, and the Professors eight hundred dollars—except the Professor of the Preparatory Department, who received six hundred dollars. During this time, they divided whatever remained after defraying the current expenses of the College, the minimum of which is twelve hundred dollars. Since 1857, the salary of the Principal has been fixed at two thousand dollars, and that of other Professors at five hundred each—with a division among the Profes-
